

HOUSING PRESERVATION PROGRAMS

We have successfully rehabilitated and repaired 43 homes in Essex, Washington, and Warren counties, enhancing the safety, energy efficiency, and overall quality of life for local residents. HOME

The New York State HOME Program is dedicated to making housing more accessible for low to moderate-income residents. Managed by the Housing Trust Fund Corporation, the program funds one of PRIDE's major home rehabilitation programs, which adheres to federal regulations. By providing home rehabilitation assistance to households with incomes at or below 80% of the area median income, with a priority for those at or below 60%, the HOME Program makes a significant impact on the quality of life for residents across the state, ensuring they have a safe and comfortable place to call home.

CDBG



Homeowner rehabilitation is a vital community development program that has a significant impact on the lives of many families nationwide through funding by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and HCR. With the flexibility provided by CDBG funds, grantees can implement emergency repair programs, spot rehabilitation, or full house rehabilitation, bringing homes up to local codes and standards. The CDBG program also allows for special purpose programs, such as energy efficiency, handicapped accessibility, emergency repair, and weatherization, ensuring that homeowners have safe, comfortable, and healthy living environments. Investing in homeowner rehabilitation can create a positive impact on the lives of residents, improving the overall quality of life and the local economy. This is a new program for PRIDE and we are profoundly thankful to the Essex County Board of Supervisors for this new partnership.





RESTORE

PRIDE's RESTORE program provides a critical lifeline to senior citizens who are struggling to make necessary repairs to their homes. RESTORE is managed by the Office of Homes and Community Renewal (HCR). The program enables eligible homeowners to maintain their independence and continue living safely and comfortably in their homes. RESTORE provides financial assistance to address emergencies and code violations, ensuring that vulnerable members of our community can receive the critical repairs they need. We have been administering the RESTORE program for over a decade, and we remain committed to ensuring that senior citizens in our community have access to safe and affordable housing.

NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

The Neighbors Helping Neighbors program provides financial assistance to low-income homeowners who cannot afford emergency home repairs. Eligible repairs include critical electrical updates, plumbing issues, furnace repairs, and other home emergencies, with awards of up to \$1,500 granted to eligible homeowners. The program is entirely funded by private donations, and 100% of the funds raised are dedicated to emergency home repairs. Neighbors Helping Neighbors demonstrates the power of community and how small acts of kindness can have a significant impact on those in need.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROGRAMS

n May 18th, after two years of diligent work by the Essex County Housing Task force, Empire State Development approved Essex County's application for a land bank. PRIDE is thrilled to announce that our rural preservation company will administer the Essex County Land Bank. This is a significant departure from PRIDE's past focus on home rehab and emergency repairs and will allow us to play a crucial role in addressing the county's housing crisis. This momentous occasion marks a milestone for PRIDE of Ticonderoga, as we take a bold step towards addressing the critical affordable housing crisis in Essex County.

Essex County, like many other parts of the state, is experiencing a severe shortage of affordable housing, forcing working professionals and young families to seek employment and establish roots elsewhere. The Essex County Board of Supervisors and PRIDE are stepping up to relieve some of the county's burden with the Land Bank program. The program removes blight by rehabilitating taxed foreclosure properties, which aligns with the Governor's goal of creating affordable homes across the state, while adhering to the Adirondack Park Agency's guidelines.

The Essex County Land Bank plans to start with rehabilitating three to five homes county-wide for the first three years, while building capacity. PRIDE's track record in rehabilitating homes and buildings is impressive, and we intend to turn these foreclosure properties into affordable homes for young workers and families who live and work in the county. Our top priority is to provide homes to those with the most urgent need, guaranteeing that they are sold to the individuals and families who need them the most, and who are ready to be homeowners. The Land Bank's first home has been donated by the Town of Jay and is located in Upper Jay. We hope to begin construction in the next few months.

A \$20,000 Generous Acts grant from the Adirondack Foundation has allowed us to receive training and expand our Continuum of Care approach to include HUD-certified housing counseling. We also were able to expand our team and hire a new fulltime Continuum of Care administrator, Mrs. Fallon Jordon, in April of this year. This new program will be used independently and in conjunction with the Land Bank. Housing Counseling will be available to all residents in PRIDE's Tri-County service area. Additionally, PRIDE will collaborate with HAPEC to provide HUD-certified homebuyer counseling to Land Bank homeowners; including financial literacy education, pre-purchase counseling, and post-purchase counseling. <image>

PRIDE coordinated and led the application effort with the Town of Ticonderoga collaboratively with all of our DRI committee members. The application featured several projects that will now be developed to make our town more welcoming and vibrant. Securing the grant was not an easy feat, and it took us nine months of careful coordination and information gathering to ensure that our application was strong. Public engagement was a key focus, and we made sure to involve the public in every step of the process. This approach has undoubtedly contributed to our success, as we have received overwhelming support from the community. As we move forward, we are excited to begin working with the Department of State to develop the final roster of projects and to continue involving the community in every aspect of the revitalization process. We are proud of the progress we have made so far, and we are more determined than ever to create a thriving and attractive downtown area that will be the pride of Ticonderoga.

In addition to our work in Ticonderoga, we are thrilled to be working with the Town of Jay to assist in their economic development aspirations. The formation of an economic development committee marks the beginning of a new chapter for the town, prioritizing downtown revitalization and improvements to housing and businesses. 

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

he culmination of two years of dedicated work is drawing to a close as we near the completion of our latest New York Mainstreet project, Paper and Pencil. Thanks to a \$500,000 award from the 2020 New York Main Street program, LaChute Ventures has partnered with PRIDE to restore an 80-year-old restaurant that had been left dormant in downtown Ticonderoga. The building, formerly known as Roofers, has been transformed into a beautiful, year-round, 200-seat restaurant and banquet space.

What makes this project so unique is the history and design of the building. The former 1820s furniture factory at 119 Burgoyne Road in Ticonderoga has been rebuilt from the ground up, breathing new life into this beloved building. By incorporating many of the original elements, the industrial-themed interior design preserves the historic charm while the addition of modern elements create an upscale dining experience with elements of fine dining service. The restaurant will be a new gathering place for locals and visitors alike along the LaChute River corridor.

Not only is this restoration project significant for its design, but it also plays a vital role in the revitalization of Ticonderoga's downtown area. With the opening of Paper & Pencil, LaChute Ventures will now have the only waterfront restaurant in Ticonderoga, putting the downtown waterfront on the map and providing a much-needed boost to the local economy. This historic renovation has created a riverfront magnet, expected to attract visitors from far and wide, creating jobs and bringing new opportunities to the area.

At PRIDE, we have a track record of assisting other downtown businesses with various NYMS grant awards since 2004, and we are proud to have culminated our efforts in this project. We believe in the importance of restoring old buildings, not only to preserve our history but to also revitalize our communities. The total restoration cost of this project is projected to be close to \$2 million dollars, but the impact on our community is priceless.

The grand opening of Paper & Pencil is set for summer 2023, and LaChute Ventures cannot wait to welcome visitors from near and far to experience the revitalization of our downtown area. We are incredibly grateful to LaChute Ventures and Tom Cunningham for their partnership, investment, and unwavering commitment to this project and the economic vitality of the Town of Ticonderoga. This is just the beginning of a new era for our community, and we invite everyone to come and be a part of it.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

END SCHOOL HUNGER

In September 2022, PRIDE of Ticonderoga announced the launch of its "End School Hunger" project, which aimed to eliminate school meal debt and combat childhood food insecurity in the community. Since then, PRIDE has funneled \$13,000 into the school system for this program. We would like to thank our donors for their generous support.

The project was initiated by PRIDE's executive director, Nicole Justice Green, who received alerts from families and school employees that some students were unable to pay for lunch and were choosing to not eat since they knew that they would incur a debt. Green recognized that universal free school meals, provided during the pandemic, would no longer be exempted by the USDA, leaving families with little time to prepare financially for this expense.

To address this issue, PRIDE leveraged \$5,000 in seed money to create a tax-deductible "school lunch reserve account." PRIDE's "End School Hunger" project has also received a boost from the Adirondack Foundation's Sudden and Urgent Needs Fund, which will help cover the cost of more than 500 school meals this year. PRIDE and the Adirondack Foundation have been partner agencies since 2016. At the end of each month, PRIDE has been administering these funds to the district finance office to pay off as much outstanding debt as possible. Additionally, PRIDE still offers "open office hours" to assist families with their free and reduced lunch applications, which can be challenging for families with non-traditional sources of income.

The "End School Hunger" project is not just an initiative to pay off school lunch debt; it is also a powerful statement of solidarity and commitment to the well-being of the community's children. According to recent data, over 10% of households in New York State experience food insecurity, and this number is even higher in rural areas like Ticonderoga. Childhood hunger can have serious consequences, including poor academic performance, behavioral problems, and physical health issues. PRIDE's project is a critical step in addressing the root causes of food insecurity in Ticonderoga by ensuring that every child has access to healthy and nutritious food, regardless of their socioeconomic status. The "End School Hunger" project is an important component of community development because it recognizes the critical role that food security plays in ensuring the health, well-being, and success of the community's children. By investing in the future of Ticonderoga, PRIDE is creating a more just and equitable community where every child has the opportunity to thrive and succeed. The project is a powerful example of what can be achieved when communities come together to address the most pressing needs of their most vulnerable members. Through collaboration, compassion, and a commitment to social justice, we can create a more equitable and just world for everyone.







ICE RINK

PRIDE of Ticonderoga is pleased to announce that the Ticonderoga Ice Rink has undergone significant improvements, making it a top-notch recreational facility for the community. Thanks to generous grants and volunteer efforts, the rink was in excellent condition and open to the public multiple weekends this winter. The Adirondack for Kids Grant removed income barriers, making the rink accessible to everyone in the community, and provided 40 pairs of ice skates in various sizes, including toddler double-bladed training models and adult sizes. To ensure the skates remained safe and secure, we placed decals on them to identify them as rink property in case of theft.

Furthermore, the Adirondack Community Recreation Alliance granted the Ticonderoga Ice Rink \$4,000 towards any rink improvement the town desired. This initiative received support from various organizations, including PRIDE of Ticonderoga and the Town of Ticonderoga, who partnered with the Charles R. Wood Foundation to provide an \$8,000 grant for the project. With over \$10,000 in funding, the rink opened numerous possibilities for expansion and improvements.

Thanks to the hard work of Ash Alexander, Mark Harrison, and Natan Belanger, the rink underwent several improvements, including the installation of a hockey perimeter board, a liner to hold in the water while it freezes, improvements to the warming hut, and the possible addition of ice refinishing tools. Our long-term vision for the rink is to expand and offer youth hockey and skating lessons, making it a lynchpin in our recreational infrastructure for winter. As an underutilized resource and asset to the town, we believe the Ticonderoga Ice Rink will help improve children's lives in the Lake George region. We are proud of the progress made thus far and look forward to the future of the rink. The Ticonderoga Ice Rink is more than just a recreational facility, it is an important asset for the community. By providing free winter outdoor recreation, the rink promotes community development, helps children develop essential life skills, and has a positive impact on local economies. Community development is crucial for creating a sense of belonging and socialization within a community. The ice rink provides a safe and welcoming environment for community members to come together and participate in winter activities such as ice skating, sledding, and snowshoeing. These activities promote physical fitness and wellness, which is essential for overall community health.

PLAYGROUND

At PRIDE of Ticonderoga, we are thrilled to announce that we have already raised \$27,000 for the Black Point Beach Playground project, including \$15,000 in grants. Our goal is to turn the need for a new playground into a reality, with some parts of a brandnew playground to hopefully be installed by this summer season.

As our community has continued to grow, the playground at Black Point Beach is long overdue for a facelift. PRIDE's Executive Director Nicole Justice Green is a huge champion for outdoor recreation, and she believes that a new playground would be an excellent addition for area youth. With free public access to Black Point Beach, everyone can enjoy the facility for birthdays and social gatherings, making it an important asset for our community. Our hope is to raise \$80,000 for this project. Working in conjunction with the town, we have applied for the Charles R. Wood Grant, which would be for \$50,000, though the grant also provides partial funding if we are unable to meet the full requested amount. We have also applied for, and received, the Cloudsplitter Grant for an additional \$10,000 and intend to pursue other New York State Parks and Recreation grants as they become available.

As an organization, we are committed to actively addressing the needs of our community and youth in meaningful ways every year. Our vision for the Black Point Beach Playground includes a number of large multi-climber sets, an activity area similar to one that Hague and other beaches have, and a slide replacement, which often serves as the centerpiece to the whole aesthetic.

We also hope to install a toddler and small child installation with spring riders, as well as a pad for basketball, and regrade the sand for the volleyball area. Childhood is short, and we want our children spending those summers playing at the beach and swimming because it's incredibly beneficial for their development. For PRIDE, this project is building upon the fourth pillar of what we represent, which is community development. We believe that by building great houses and investing in the well-being of our children, we will attract new residents to our town. HISTORIC PRESERVATION PROJECTS

ver the past year, PRIDE of Ticonderoga has made significant progress in our mission to preserve and promote the rich history of the area. Thanks to grants from the DEC Smartgrowth and the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership, we completed two exciting projects that have helped us gain a deeper understanding of Ticonderoga's unique heritage.


One of our most significant achievements was the completion and publication of the report on Ticonderoga's oldest industry and LaChute River. This project, made possible by the DEC Smartgrowth grant of \$100,000, was a collaboration with Fort Ticonderoga and the Town of Ticonderoga, and it provided insights for potential reconstruction efforts in the future. The preservation of the sawmill is important because it helps to maintain Ticonderoga's rich history and provide insights into the town's oldest industry.

In addition, PRIDE received a \$7,500 grant from the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership on behalf of the Town of Ticonderoga, which enabled us to upgrade 12 interpretive signs along the LaChute River Walk. These themed interpretive signs will highlight the impact of the Clean Water Act on local and regional waterways, as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of this important legislation. The signs' content and graphics were updated, and the existing sign bases were refurbished thanks to the in-kind support of the Ticonderoga Historical Society and the Town of Ticonderoga Parks and Recreation Department. We are thrilled to have completed both projects in December 2022. The information we have gained from these projects can be used to educate future generations about the importance of preserving our cultural heritage. Additionally, historic preservation can be a key driver of economic development by attracting visitors and supporting local businesses that cater to history buffs and heritage tourists.

The signs have been ordered and will be installed this year, adding to the many other attractions that draw visitors to Ticonderoga. This kind of historic preservation is crucial because it helps us to connect with the past and understand the events and people that shaped our community. It also helps us to appreciate the natural beauty and resources of the region and recognize the importance of protecting them for future generations.

We would like to express our gratitude to all those who contributed to these projects, including the DEC, the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership, Fort Ticonderoga, the Ticonderoga Historical Society, and the Town of Ticonderoga Parks and Recreation Department. We would also like to thank our former Executive Directors for their years of work guiding our organization towards achieving our mission of historic preservation.
